Funds will be used to ensure that that there are enough personnel to keep the building very clean. More cleaning products will be available and sanitizer stations will be located throughout the building. Air filtration systems will be purchased to be placed in all the classrooms. Temperature reading equipment will be purchased to be used to record the temperatures of all staff and students entering the building.

Summer Enrichment and summer learning will be instituted to address the academic gaps that were created by the circumstances that were brought about by the pandemic.

Purchase Sanitizing supplies, air purifiers, HVAC Economizers installation and filters change to improve air quality

4. Process for Monitoring Implementation.
